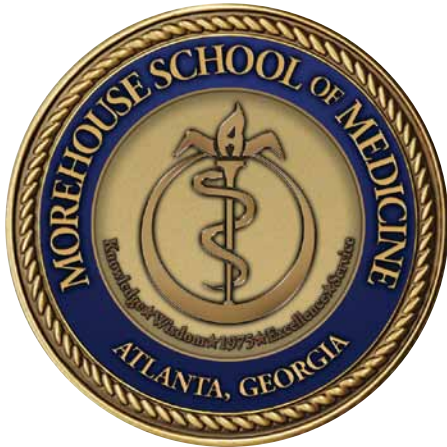

Centers and Institutes

The Morehouse School of Medicine has established a number of multidisciplinary centers and institutes in targeted areas that maximize our resources and build upon our institutional strengths. Funding for the centers and institutes is provided from private and federal gifts and grants.

Atlanta Clinical and Translational Science Institute

The Atlanta Clinical and Translational Science Institute (ACTSI) is an inter-institutional magnet that concentrates basic, translational, and clinical investigators, community clinicians, professional societies, and industry collaborators in dynamic clinical and translational research projects.

Cardiovascular Research Institute

The Cardiovascular Research Institute (CVRI) was established in 1999 under the direction of Dr. Gary H. Gibbons, with funding from the NIH National Center for Minority Health and Health Disparities and the NIH Heart, Lung and Blood Institute program to develop cardiovascular research centers at Historically Black Colleges and Universities. The CVRI is a multi-investigator, multidisciplinary organization that transcends traditional academic structures to focus on advancing cardiovascular research and education.

Center of Excellence on Health Disparities

The MSM Center of Excellence on Health Disparities was formed in 2002 under the leadership of Dr. David Satcher to develop transferable models for the elimination of health disparities. The Center takes a three-dimensional approach to eliminating health disparities by defining and monitoring disparities in health outcomes, conducting a balanced research agenda and intervening at identified points of attack.

Clinical Research Center

The Clinical Research Center (CRC) was established in 1996 to provide the infrastructure for faculty at MSM to conduct clinical research. It was the first freestanding outpatient research facility of its kind in the nation to receive accreditation by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Health Care Organizations. The center has dedicated clinical research space, equipment, personnel and technological support to facilitate investigator-initiated and multi-center clinical trials in cardiovascular disease, cancer, clinical pharmacology, HIV AIDS and community based research.

Center of Laboratory Animal Resources (CLAR)

Since its inception, the Center for Laboratory Animal Resources (CLAR) has centralized most research and teaching animal care for the Atlanta University Center consortium. Our purpose is to provide total animal care services as needed to all academic and/or research faculty and staff affiliated with any one of the member institutions of the Atlanta University Center (AUC).

National Center for Primary Care

The National Center for Primary Care (NCPC) was established in 1998 with a grant from the Office of Minority Health, as a national resource for encouraging doctors to pursue primary care careers, for making primary care practice more effective, and for supporting primary professionals serving in underserved areas. The NCPC team provides training for primary care practitioners, conducts practice-based research to improve health outcomes, creates protocols and tools for improving primary care effectiveness, and undertakes policy analyses focused on how to make primary care more accessible and more effective.

Neuroscience Institute

The Neuroscience Research Institute (MSMNI) was established in 1995 under the direction of Dr. Peter MacLeish to create a supportive and challenging environment for the investigation and teaching of the functional organization of the nervous system and to seek ways to reduce suffering brought about by neurological disorders. Members of the MSMNI are involved in teaching graduate students, medical students and health care professionals, and a Summer Undergraduate Research Program targeting college students that is designed to provide early opportunities to explore biomedical research career options.

Prevention Research Center

The MSM Prevention Research Center (PRC) was established in 1998. Directed by Dr. Eileen Yancey, it is one of a network of 33 academic research centers funded by the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to achieve local and national health objectives focused on gaining knowledge about the best methodologies for solving the nation's obstinate health problems. The research activities of the PRC include: reduction of HIV risk behavior, cancer prevention, youth violence prevention and reduction, adolescent health promotion, men's health promotion, environmental health, and cardiovascular disease prevention.

Research Centers in Minority Institutions

Major support for the biomedical research infrastructure of MSM is received through the RCMI Program, which is sponsored by the National Centers for Research Resources of the National Institutes of Health. State of the art biomedical research technology cores, shared use facilities, and other resources (e.g., Information Technology) at MSM have been developed with RCMI funds for use by our scientific investigators. RCMI support has also facilitated the development of several areas of research focus at the institution (e.g., cardiovascular disease, HIV/AIDS, neuroscience, reproductive biology, and molecular immunology).

The Satcher Health Leadership Institute

Develop a diverse group of public health leaders, foster and support leadership strategies, and influence policies and practices toward the reduction and ultimate elimination of disparities in health with the focus on neglected diseases and underserved populations, while giving priority to health promotion and disease prevention.

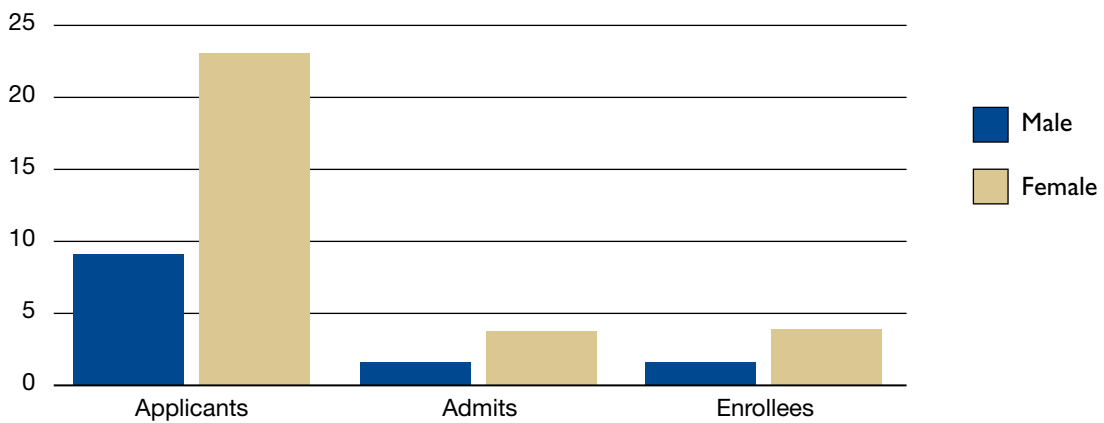

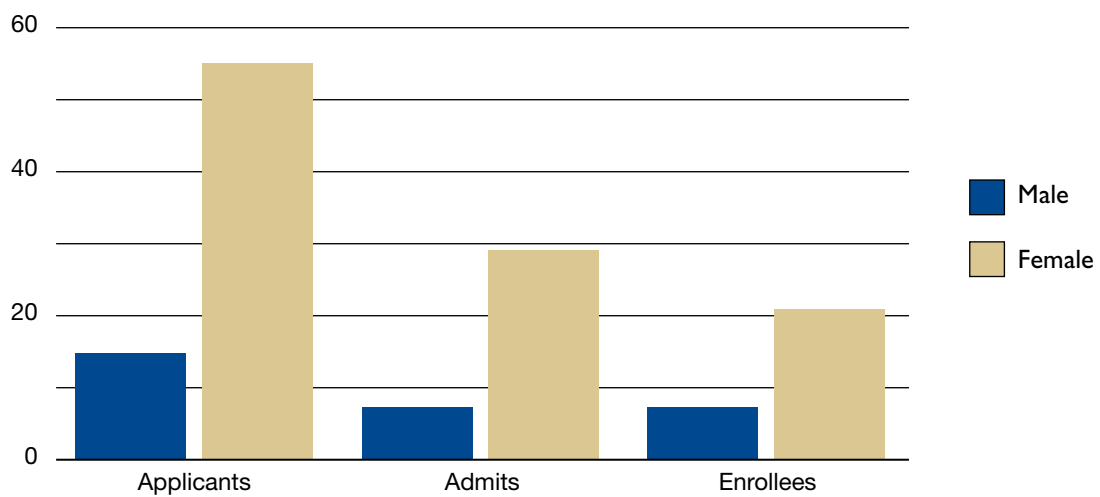

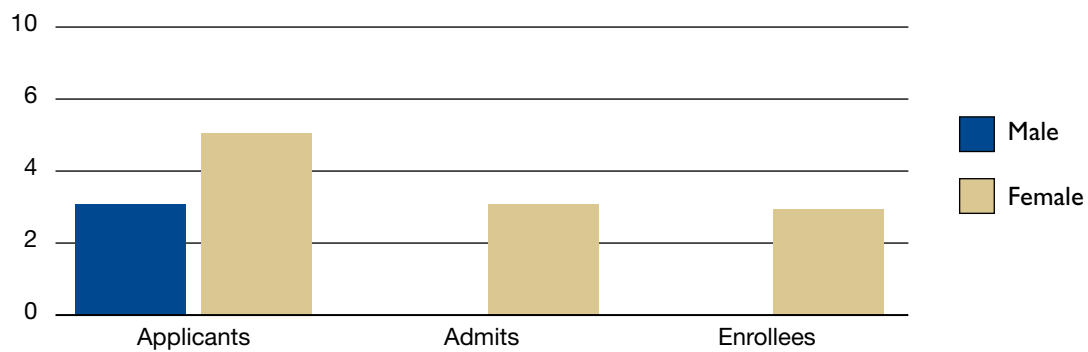

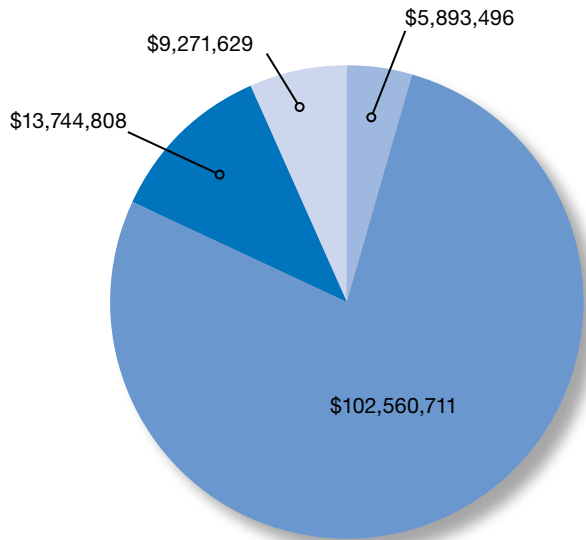

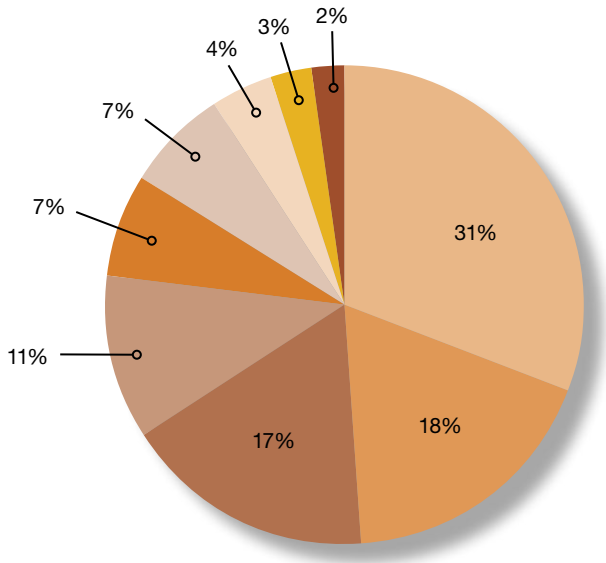
MSM Total Revenues and Other Additions 2009

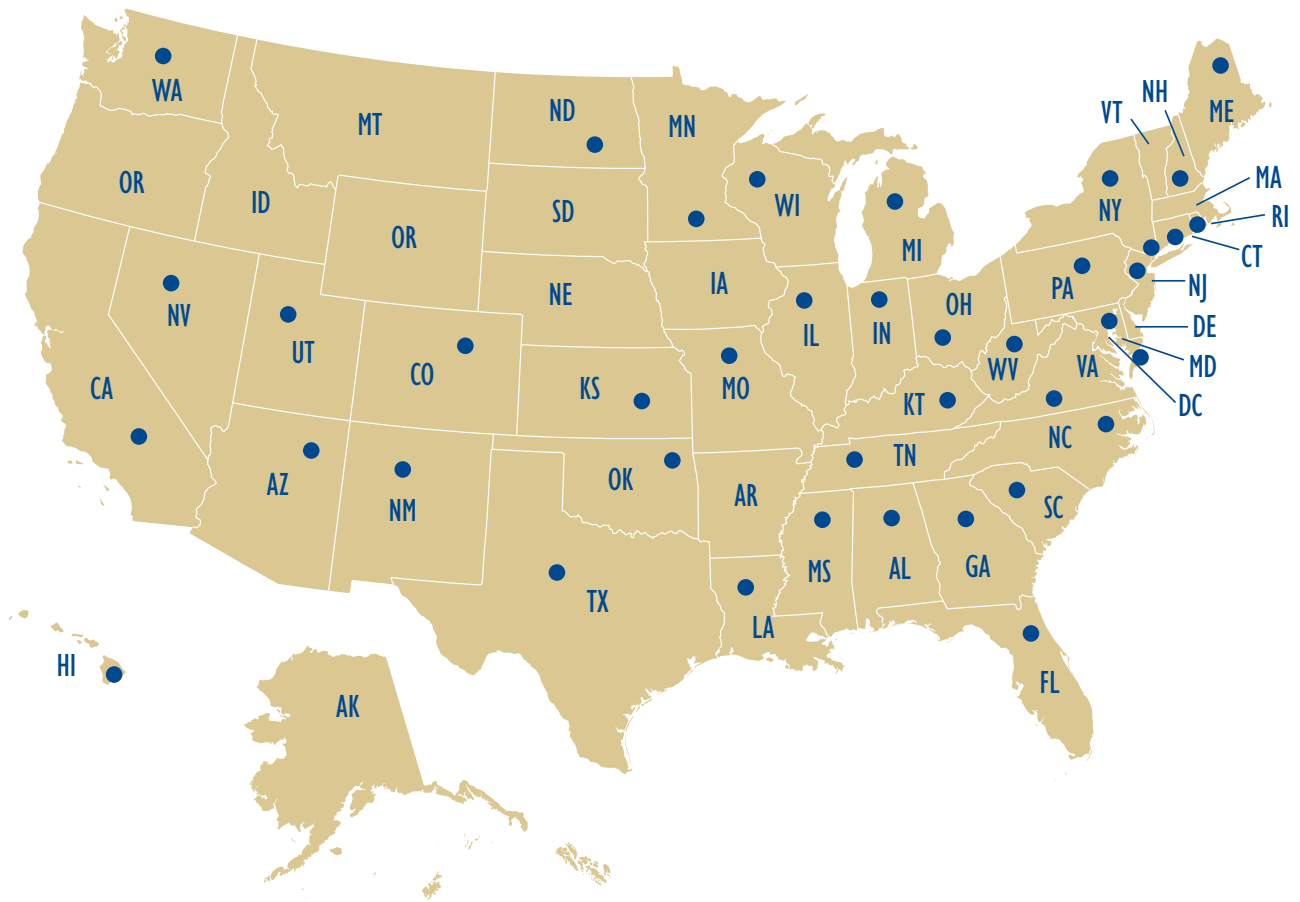
